## Reflection:

A well-circulated Hasidic tale tells the story of a rabbi quizzing his students. He asked, "How can we determine the hour of dawn, when the night ends and the day begins?" One of the students suggested, "Day begins when, from a distance, you can distinguish between a dog and a sheep." "No," answered the rabbi. Another student asked, "Is it when you can distinguish between a fig tree and a grapevine?"
Again the answer was, "No." "Please tells us the answer then," said the students. "It is," said the rabbi, "when you can look into the face of other human beings and you have enough light in you to recognize them as your sisters and brothers. Up until then, it is night, and darkness is still with us."
